1. Introduction

The RangeVue[™]15 and RangeVue[™]30 radar sensors monitor the water level of rivers, lakes, tidal seas, and reservoirs, and is ideal for areas where submersed sensors can be damaged due to corrosion, contamination, flood-related debris, lightning, or vandalism. The RangeVue 30 can measure distances up to 30 m (98.4 ft) and the RangeVue 15 can measure distances up to 15 m (49.2 ft).

The RangeVue 15 and RangeVue 30 radar sensors output a digital SDI-12 signal to indicate distance and stage. The output is acceptable for recording devices with SDI-12 capability.

2. Precautions

- READ AND UNDERSTAND the Safety section at the back of this manual.
- Follow country-specific installation standards, prevailing safety regulations, accident prevention rules, and this manual's safety instructions. The sensor is designed for safe operation in accordance with the current technical, safety, and ANSI standards.
- The emitting frequencies of the RangeVue-series is well below the internationally permitted limits. When used correctly, the radar sensor presents no danger to people.
- Do not attempt to install the sensor unless you are qualified to perform the installation.
- Handle the sensor carefully, since it is a precision instrument.
- If installing the sensor from tall structures over water, use appropriate safety equipment such as a safety harness or a life preserver when installing or performing maintenance on the sensor.
- The user is responsible for ensuring that the sensor is maintained and functioning properly.

3. Initial inspection

When unpacking the equipment, do the following:

- Unpack the unit in a clean, dry area.
- Carefully open the shipping package, ensuring that the cable jacket is not damaged or cut.
 Contact Campbell Scientific if the cable was damaged during unpacking.
- Inspect the equipment for any damage that occurred during shipping. If equipment was damaged during shipping, file a claim with the carrier and report the damage in detail.


4. QuickStart

A video that describes data logger programming using *Short Cut* is available at: www.campbellsci.com/videos/cr1000x-data logger-getting-started-program-part-3 . *Short Cut* is an easy way to program your data logger to measure the sensor and assign data logger wiring terminals. *Short Cut* is available as a download on www.campbellsci.com . It is included in installations of *LoggerNet*, *RTDAQ*, and *PC400*.


The following procedure also shows using **Short Cut** to program the RangeVue-series.

- 1. Open Short Cut and click Create New Program.
- 2. Double-click the data logger model.

3. In the Available Sensors and Devices box, type RangeVue or find the sensor in the Sensors > Water > Level & Flow folder, and double-click RangeVue15/RangeVue30 Radar Water Level Sensor. SDI-12 Address defaults to 0. Enter the correct SDI-12 Address if the address has been changed from the factory default value. Check the Measure concurrently box if you want to use the C! SDI-12 command. By default, the sensor units are meters and degrees Celsius. The units are changed using the extended SDI-12 commands (Configuring sensor via extended SDI-12 commands and terminal emulator [p. 21]).




4. Click the Wiring tab. Click OK after wiring the sensor.



5. Repeat steps three and four for other sensors you want to measure. Click Next.


6. In Output Setup, type the scan rate, a Table Name, and Data Output Storage Interval. Click Next.



NOTE:

Because of the delays using SDI-12, Campbell Scientific recommends measurement scans of 10 seconds or more.

7. Select the output options.



- 8. Click **Finish** and save the program. Send the program to the data logger if the data logger is connected to the computer.
- If the sensor is connected to the data logger, check the output of the sensor in the data display in *LoggerNet*, *RTDAQ*, or *PC400* to make sure it is making reasonable measurements.

5. Overview

The radar sensor consists of an integrated microwave transmitter and sensor. A built-in SDI-12 interface provides data processing and SDI-12 communications with the data logger.




Figure 5-1. RangeVue-series stage, distance, and offset

The RangeVue-series emits a continuous, frequency-modulated radar signal and measures the elapsed time between the emission and return of the signal. The elapsed time measurement is used to calculate the distance between the sensor face and the target (for example, water, grain, slurry). The distance value is used to determine depth of the medium (Figure 5-1 [p. 5]).

The RangeVue 30 can measure distances up to 30 m (98.4 ft) and the RangeVue 15 can measure distances up to 15 m (49.2 ft). The RangeVue 15 also has mounting threads to facilitate pipe mounting.




Figure 6-1. Reference line for measurement range




Figure 6-2. RangeVue 15 dimensions




Figure 6-3. RangeVue 30 dimensions

7.1 Wiring to the data logger

CAUTION:

To avoid shock or damage to the instrument, never apply power while wiring.

CAUTION:

Ensure that the RangeVue-series is properly wired to the data logger before applying power. Applying power when incorrectly wired could damage the RangeVue-series beyond repair.

Connect the RangeVue-series to the data logger in the order shown in Table 7-1 (p. 9).

¹ C and U terminals are automatically configured by the measurement instruction.			

If multiple SDI-12 sensors are connected to a data logger, Campbell Scientific recommends using separate terminals when possible. However, multiple SDI-12 sensors or multiple RangeVue-series sensors can connect to the same data logger control or **U** terminal. Each must have a unique SDI-12 address. Valid addresses are 0 through 9, a through z, and A through Z. The RangeVue-series ships with a default SDI-12 address of 0.

For the CR6 and CR1000X, triggering conflicts may occur when a companion terminal is used for a triggering instruction such as TimerInput(), PulseCount(), or WaitDigTrig(). For example, if the RangeVue-series is connected to C3 on a CR1000X, C4 cannot be used in the TimerInput(), PulseCount(), or WaitDigTrig() instructions.

NOTE:

After connecting the sensor to power, the sensor performs a BIST (built-in self-test) for approximately 50 seconds (factory default). During this self-check, an internal check of the electronics occurs.

7.2 Data logger programming

Short Cut is the best source for up-to-date programming code for Campbell Scientific data loggers. If your data acquisition requirements are simple, you can probably create and maintain a data logger program exclusively with **Short Cut**. If your data acquisition needs are more complex, the files that **Short Cut** creates are a great source for programming code to start a new program or add to an existing custom program.

NOTE:

Short Cut cannot edit programs after they are imported and edited in CRBasic Editor.

A *Short Cut* tutorial is available in QuickStart (p. 2). If you wish to import *Short Cut* code into *CRBasic Editor* to create or add to a customized program, follow the procedure in Importing Short Cut code into CRBasic Editor (p. 26). Programming basics for CRBasic data loggers are provided in the following sections. Downloadable example programs are available at www.campbellsci.com/downloads/rangevue-example-programs .

7.2.1 CRBasic programming

This instruction sends a request to the sensor to make a measurement and then retrieves the measurement from the sensor. See for more information.

For most data loggers, the SDI12Recorder() instruction has the following syntax:

SDI12Recorder(Destination, SDIPort, SDIAddress, "SDICommand", Multiplier, Offset, FillNAN, WaitonTimeout)

For the **SDIAddress**, alphabetical characters need to be enclosed in quotation marks (for example, "A"). Also enclose the **SDICommand** in quotation marks as shown. The **Destination** parameter must be an array. The required number of values in the array depends on the command (see).

FillNAN and **WaitonTimeout** are optional parameters (refer to the *CRBasic Editor* help for more information).

7.2.2 Field installation

Consider the following while selecting the site:

• Sensor height: Mount the sensor high enough to prevent submersion during flooding conditions.

WARNING:

Since the sensor is commonly installed over water from tall structures, use appropriate safety equipment such as a safety harness or a life preserver when installing or performing maintenance on the sensor.

• Water surface: Install the sensor above the smoothest part of the water surface.

NOTE:

The smoothest part of the water surface is typically found halfway between bridge piers. However, bridges with long spans between the piers experience more vibration. For these bridges, vibration can be minimized by mounting the sensor a quarter to a third of the distance to the next pier.

- Horizontal structures: Avoid mounting near horizontal structural surfaces such as beams, brackets, and sidewall joints because these surfaces reflect a strong signal.




Figure 7-1. Beam path clearances

- Obstructions: Mount the sensor away from obstructions (both above and under water) in the radiation beam path, which spreads as it leaves the sensor. Obstructions to be aware of include excessive waves, splashing, pipes, wires, rocks, bridge piers, and logs. Determine the required clearance for the beam angle using the following formulas and Figure 7-1 (p. 12).

CAUTION:

Be aware that bridges contract and expand with temperature changes. Traffic loads or trucks can also cause changes to the bridge height.

After choosing an appropriate site, mount and align the sensor using the following procedure:

1. Secure the RangeVue-series bracket to a 1-inch diameter nominal pipe) using the V-clamp, washers, lock washers, and nuts (see Figure 7-2 [p. 13]).




Figure 7-3. RangeVue-series bracket

2. Place the RangeVue-series in the bracket (see Figure 7-2 [p. 13] and Figure 7-3 [p. 13]).




Figure 7-4. Polarization markings

3. Orient the sensor such that the middle of the sensor label is aligned or parallel with the wall or pier (Figure 7-4 [p. 14] and Figure 7-5 [p. 14]).

- 4. Use a bubble level to make certain the antenna horn is aligned within 1° of vertical. A measurement error will be introduced if the antenna is not perpendicular to the water surface. The maximum range is reduced because of the off-axis return signal.
- 5. Secure the RangeVue-series to the bracket by tightening the counter nut (see Figure 7-2 [p. 13] and Figure 7-6 [p. 15]).

6. Connect the cable, route it to the data logger, then secure it to the bracket and mounting pipe using cable ties.

7.2.3 Determine and set reference stage

Change the reference stage setting at deployment. This setting allows the sensor to complete an offset calculation. Every future measurement will use the offset and the current distance measurement to calculate water stage or depth.

Using a staff plate or other physical datum, measure water level at the measurement site. Record the measurement. Ensure that the measurement is in the same units as the sensor unit setting. Default value is feet.

Enter reference stage using a terminal emulator (Configuring sensor via extended SDI-12 commands and terminal emulator [p. 21]).

8.1 Default settings

Table 8-1 (p. 16) shows the default settings. The default settings are changed using SDI-12 commands (Table 8-2 [p. 17]) and a terminal emulator (Configuring sensor via extended SDI-12 commands and terminal emulator [p. 21]). The reference stage settings must be changed. The other default settings can be used in most circumstances.

8.2 SDI-12 commands

8.2 (p. 17) shows the measurement and extended SDI-12 commands for the RangeVue-series. The RangeVue-series responds to the M!, C!, CC!, RO!, and ROC! SDI-12 measurement commands. When using an M! command, the data logger waits for the time specified by the sensor, sends the D! command, pauses its operation, and waits until either it receives the data from the sensor or the sensor timeout expires. If the data logger receives no response, it will send the command a total of three times, with three retries for each attempt, or until a response is received.

The C! command follows the same pattern as the M! command with the exception that it does not require the data logger to pause its operation until the values are ready. Rather, the data logger retrieves the data with the D! command on the next pass through the program. Another measurement request is then sent so that data are ready on the next scan.

The RO! command directly reads the sensor measurements and outputs all of its values.

The MC!, CC!, and ROC! commands are the same as the previous commands, but where the C at the end of the command forces a validation for the data received from the sensor using a checksum. If the checksum is invalid, the data logger will re-request the data up to three times. The checksum validation increases the measurement time by about 40 milliseconds if there are no errors. Retries will increase the measurement time in proportion to the number of retries. The checksum option is necessary only for long cable lengths or when electronic noise may impact measurement transmission to the data logger.

Information about using the extended commands are provided in Configuring sensor via extended SDI-12 commands and terminal emulator (p. 21).

¹a is the sensor address. In the SDI12Recorder() CRBasic instruction, the command parameter does not include the SDI-12 address because the address is a separate parameter.

²A higher signal-to-noise ratio (SNR) signifies a stronger and clearer radar signal relative to the noise. A good SNR can vary based on several factors including the specific sensor design, operating environment, and application requirements. As a general guideline, above 10 dB is the minimum threshold to reliably distinguish the signal from noise and interference. A SNR above 20 dB is a very good SNR, indicating a strong and clear signal with minimal interference, which can lead to highly accurate measurements.

8.3 Status codes

The M!, C!, CC!, RO!, RCO!, and V! SDI-12 commands report device-status codes (Table 8-3 [p. 20]), and several of the extended SDI-12 commands report operational-status codes (Table 8-4 [p. 21]).



8.4 Configuring sensor via extended SDI-12 commands and terminal emulator

The RangeVue-series is fully configurable using SDI-12 extended commands through a terminal emulator program. The following instructions step you through the initial setup process. 8.2 (p. 17) lists all the extended SDI-12 commands and the values that are returned. It is possible to


completely reset the sensor to factory defaults settings as well. Most of the extended SDI-12 commands require 2 seconds to complete the change when the sensor is in normal power mode.

- 1. Connect the RangeVue-series to your data logger (Wiring to the data logger [p. 9]).
- 2. Connect to the data logger using *LoggerNet* and open the terminal emulator. In *LoggerNet*, the terminal emulator is located at: LoggerNet > Main > Connect > data logger > Terminal Emulator.
- 3. Click Open Terminal.
- 4. Press **Enter** until a prompt appears.



5. If using a Campbell Scientific data logger, type **SDI12** < Enter> once the prompt is present.

6. Enter the number corresponding to the terminal your sensor is wired into.



7. Set the **Current or Reference Stage**. This should be set at deployment. Using a staff plate or other physical datum at the study site, measure and enter the current stage. This allows the sensor to complete an offset calculation based on the entered stage and the measured distance to water surface. Every future measurement will use the offset and measured distance to water surface to calculate water stage or depth.

Command: 0XSS+50! (where 50 is the reference stage)

Response: 0+50.000+000

The sensor response includes the sensor address (0) + reference stage (50.000) + status code (000).

8. The default SDI-12 address for the sensor is **0**. Change the sensor address if you will have more than one SDI-12 sensor on the same terminal with the **aAb!** command, where a is the current sensor address and b is the desired address. The sensor will respond with the new address if it was successfully changed.

Command: 0A1!

Response: 1

- 9. The default stage/distance units are meters. To change the units, use the **aXWDU+d!** command, where **d** is 0 (meters), 1 [feet], 2 (millimeters), or 3 (inches). Refer to SDI-12 commands (p. 17) for more information.
- 10. The default temperature units are degree Celsius. To change the units, use the aXWTU+t!, where t is 0 (°C), 1 (°F), or 2 (K). Refer to SDI-12 commands (p. 17) for more information.
- 11. Set the **Power Mode** of the sensor. The default power mode is normal and has a numeric code of 1. Low power mode turns off the processor of the sensor in between measurements consuming significantly less power. However, it will take longer to respond to each measurement command since it will power down after a measurement is complete. Measurement time will be a function of boot time and the integration time. To run in low power mode, use the following command.

Command: 0XWPOM+0!

Response: 0+0+000

The sensor response includes the sensor address (0) + power mode (0) + error code (000).

9. Maintenance, diagnostics, and repair

NOTE:

All factory repairs and recalibrations require a returned material authorization (RMA) and completion of the "Statement of Product Cleanliness and Decontamination" form. Refer to the Assistance page for more information.

The RangeVue-series is maintenance free under normal operation.

9.1 Testing procedure

1. Double-check all wiring connections.

CAUTION:

The data logger cannot issue SDI-12 commands when a USB cable is connected to the sensor.

- 2. Connect the sensor to your data logger and apply +12 V power.
- 3. Send the Acknowledge Active command (a!). This command is used to check the presence of the sensor on the bus. Only the address is sent back in response.
- 4. Send the Identification command (aI!).
- 5. Compare the output stage versus the actual stage using the Start Measurement command (aM!) followed by the Send Data command (aD!).

9.2 Cyclic redundancy check

The cyclic redundancy check (CRC) is used to produce and send a small, fixed-size checksum of a larger block of data to the data logger. This checksum detects errors after transmission or storage. The CRC is computed and added before any transmission or storage. The CRC is also authenticated by the recipient, after the transmission, to confirm that no alterations occurred. CRCs are good at identifying errors caused by noise in transmission channels.

Appendix A. Importing Short Cut code into CRBasic Editor

Short Cut creates a .DEF file that contains wiring information and a program file that can be imported into **CRBasic Editor**. By default, these files reside in the C:\campbellsci\SCWin folder.

Import *Short Cut* program file and wiring information into *CRBasic Editor*:

1. Create the *Short Cut* program, then save it. Click the *Advanced* tab then the *CRBasic Editor* button. Your program file will open in CRBasic with a generic name. Provide a meaningful name and save the CRBasic program. This program can now be edited for additional refinement.

NOTE:

Once the file is edited with *CRBasic Editor*, *Short Cut* can no longer be used to edit the program.

- 2. To add the *Short Cut* wiring information into the new CRBasic program, open the .DEF file located in the C:\campbellsci\SCWin folder. Copy the wiring information found at the beginning of the .DEF file.
- 3. Go into the CRBasic program and paste the wiring information at the beginning of the program.
- 4. In the CRBasic program, highlight the wiring information, right-click, and select **Comment Block**. This adds an apostrophe (') to the beginning of each of the highlighted lines, which instructs the data logger compiler to ignore those lines when compiling. The **Comment Block** feature is demonstrated at about 5:10 in the CRBasic | Features video .

Appendix B. SDI-12 version 1.4 identify measurement commands and responses

Version 1.4 compliant sensors must respond to identify commands for each type of measurement command and each parameter with a command. The broad identify commands return how many variables will be returned with a given measurement command and the time it will take the sensor to respond. The specific identify parameter commands will return a SHEF code, the measurement units, and the type of measurement (sample, count, or average). For more information see the SDI-12 version 1.4 specification.

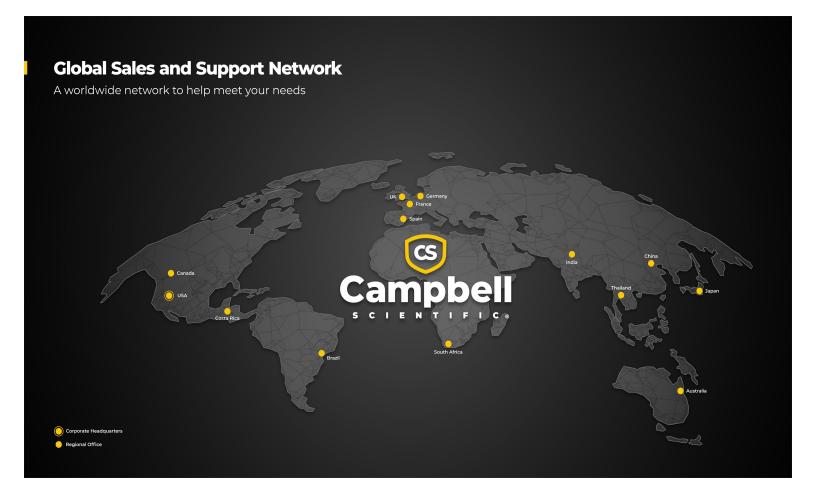
Avoiding unnecessary exposure to radio transmitter radiation
